THE FUTURE OF BECCS IS LOOKING UNCERTAIN – CCNF COMMENTS

This week – David Joffe – the head of carbon budgets at the Climate Change Committee (CCC) has described potential problems over the sustainability of biomass as a "real key issue".

Last year, a study from NRDC argued that Drax's plan to install carbon capture systems at its giant wood-pellet burning power station in North Yorkshire, "isn't even close to carbon neutral, let alone carbon negative". Now, after addressing a session at the EAC, Joffe agreed that imported biomass is "not something that the UK should be relying on at large scale."
